Wiltshire Bee and Honey Day

Wiltshire Beekeeping Association (WBKA) held its annual Bee and Honey Day on Saturday 9th October. Having cancelled the show in 2020 owing to Covid, it was a welcome opportunity for beekeepers from across Wiltshire and neighbouring counties to meet, compete and learn.

It also enabled beekeepers to demonstrate all aspects of the craft of beekeeping to the public. Between 450 and 500 people dropped in to see what was going on, to purchase local honey, sample Wadworth Brewery's Happy Days beer and visit the various stalls.

The Honey Show

There were over 170 items entered into the Honey Show, not just honey but wax blocks, wax candles and wax flowers. Some mead, several photos and some splendid drawings from children.

The entries were judged by Hazel Blackburn, a British Beekeepers Association (BBKA) National Show judge, assisted by two trainees, Claire O'Brien and Bridget Knutson. Together they used their expertise to determine which entry was best in class sampling every jar of honey and scrutinising the wax products and photos.

Chris Rawlings, President of WBKA, won the Methuen Cup for the individual with the most points in all classes. Geraldine Lenert, like Chris a member of West Wilts BKA (WWBKA), won the Norman Lovegrove Trophy for her delicious bottle of raspberry melomel. Sian Simms (WWBKA) won the King Shield for the best jar of honey, a fine achievement having only started beekeeping four years ago. Elaine Irvine (WWBKA) seen here collecting the David Wicks Cup for the best frame for extraction. While Gavin James from Swindon BKA won the Novice Cup. It was no surprise when WWBKA won the Applegate Trophy for the branch with the most points.

The trophies were presented by Councillor Peter Corbett, Deputy Mayor of Devizes, who also judged the open classes for children. Winnie May Foster Hugh of Holy Trinity Primary Academy in Great Cheverell won the 4-6 year old class: Carolyn Read from the same school won the 7-10 year old class.

The Elder class at Silverwood School in Rowde created a montage to win the Drawing of a Bee on a Flower class for children aged 11-13. Nathan Nichols, also of Silverwood School won the Calligram class for those aged 14-18.

The Talks

There were four talks upstairs in the Wessex Room.

Ken Basterfield NDB spoke on "Tools and Techniques for making Beekeeping Easier" and "Reading bees - what to look for when inspecting a colony". Marin Anastasov NDB explored "The Mind of the Honey Bee". All three talks provided useful advice to beekeepers whatever their level of knowledge and experience.

Eden Renewables were the event's main sponsors and on their behalf Dr Guy Parker explained how solar farms can set an example for diversity in the environment.

Finally Richard Oliver gave a talk entitled "So you think you want to keep bees" designed to explain what it means to be a beekeeper including the cost and commitment as well as the benefits.

Over 50 people attended so the beginners courses next year could be very popular.

The Stands

There were seven trade stalls: five charities also took stalls. Talking to a few of the stall holders after the event they seemed to have had a good day not least because those attending had a specific interest in their work and were keen to learn more. This is good news because these stalls help make the day more inclusive than a straightforward honey show. (*Photo opposite shows just one of the stalls in the main hall.*)

Geraldine was a knowledgeable beekeeper holding the Intermediate Theory and Honey Bee Health Certificates. She was secretary and apiary manager for West Wiltshire BKA and a keen supporter of new beekeepers. Geraldine's artistic talents came to the fore with the quality of her honey, mead and especially wax. WBKA - Courses

Beekeeping Tips for November

Feeding. Colonies will have been checked for stores in September and hopefully you will have hefted them at the time in order to get a feel for their weight. It is all too easy to assume that they will then have enough stores to see them through until spring. However, it has been an exceptionally mild October and colonies have been collecting pollen from the ivy and the queens will have been laying up winter bees. While the winter bees are most welcome, foraging and feeding uses stores so be prepared to supplement with fondant if necessary.

It is good practice to heft your hives on a regular basis and act if they feel light. In a normal winter colonies should spend much of the time in cluster and from November to January should only

get through a kilo of stores per colony per month, i.e. 6kg. Thereafter consumption increases.



Diseases and Pests. With the queen laying later owing to the warmer weather, there will be fresh brood for *Varroa* to reproduce in brood cells. It is a good idea to check *Varroa* levels towards the end of November and decide whether or not you need to treat with oxalic in December. If in doubt feed fondant and treat for *Varroa*. Better safe than sorry!

The Apiary. Now is a good time to have one last mow or strim in the apiary. Long grass harbours moisture creating a damp atmosphere. Bees don't like the damp, so anything we can do to minimise it will benefit the bees over the winter months.
